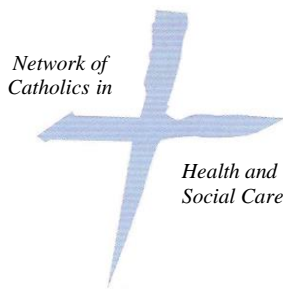

Rev Dr Gerry Arbuckle SM

Gerald Arbuckle, SM, Ph.D., is a Cambridge University graduate in social anthropology and an award-winning author in applying anthropology to pastoral issues. A former member of the Independent Panel to oversee the reform of the public health system in NSW, Australia, he is a consultant to Catholic healthcare systems in USA, Canada, and Australia, on ways to maintain Catholic values. Following research into the UK National Health Service, he delivered the Martin D'Arcy, SJ, Lectures at Oxford University in 2011 on the crisis of values in health services. Among his books are 'Humanizing Healthcare Reforms' and 'Catholic Identity or Identities? Refounding Ministries in Chaotic Times'.

Rev Dr James Hanvey SJ

Dr Hanvey is Master of Campion Hall, Oxford and a member of the Faculty of Theology and Religion. His particular research and teaching interests are in the areas of Trinitarian Theology, Pneumatology, Ecclesiology and Catholic Social Thought as well as Ignatian Spirituality. Two recent publications to which he has contributed are Understanding Human Dignity, ed. Prof. Christopher McCrudden, OUP (2013) and The Second Vatican Council: Celebrating its Achievements and its Future, ed. Gavin D'Costa, T & T Clark (2013). He is currently writing on Catholic Social Thought, a theology of Healthcare (collected essays) and Pneumatology. Cf. essays in America



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
