

Teaching children to pray before the Eucharist

Teaching children to pray before the Eucharist

This guide aims to give a few examples and a starting point of how children may be invited to pray before the Eucharist.

Please adjust the liturgies if necessary, taking into consideration the age, stage and prior knowledge and understanding of the children.

The *Holding Hearts* follow up sessions may be a way to enhance the Catholic Life of the school, parish and home. You may find other ways to 'go forth' that may engage children in turning their heartfelt prayers into action.

This may be the first time that children will be invited to pray before Jesus in this way. Build time slowly and increase prayers as they grow and develop.

The most important time for the children and for yourself is silent time with Jesus. You are the role models, if you pray with an open generous heart and show how we can live as Jesus, they will too!



Guiding children before gathering...

Below is an example of what you may like to say to children before they gather in front of the Blessed Sacrament. This is intended to be a general introduction and may need to be adapted to suit the age, stage, knowledge and prior understanding of the children.

It may also need adapting if ...

there is a priest or deacon present,

you are gathering with the monstrance placed in the prayer space, the Blessed Sacrament is taken from the Tabernacle when children have already gathered in the prayer space.

You are invited to gather together to be with Jesus. (A consecrated host) Jesus is placed inside the monstrance.

We can see Jesus and know that He is truly present with us.

We will sing hymns, say prayers and you will have quiet, silent time with Him.

I/We will guide you, show you what to do and help you to know when it is time for silence.

When you are silent you may want to pray to Jesus from your heart.

As we gather we can kneel/genuflect and make the Sign of the Cross.

Priest/Deacon... will bless us all. (If a priest or deacon is present)

We can then go out from here and live out what we have listened to, thought about and prayed for.

Praying before the Eucharist **Preparation**

Will music be used as children reflect?
Will there be visual aids?
How will children become closer to Jesus?
How will you guide them?
What gifts of Jesus will be shared through Scripture?
When will there be an opportunity for children to pray for themselves and others?
How will children be renewed and invigorated and live out the Eucharist?

Exposition Gather	Reflective silence when gathering. Genuflection and the Sign of the Cross before Jesus.
	Who do you want to pray for today? Tell Jesus what is in your heart and how you need Him to help you and know that He will always hear you.
Adoration Listen	Reading: Gospel according to Luke 17: 11-19
Adoration Respond	Silent reflection – time with Jesus What do we learn from this Gospel story? What do you want to thank Jesus for today? How do you need Jesus to help you?
	Litany: Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.
	Traditional Prayer: Our Father
Benediction (priest or deacon)	Hymn: Be Still Blessing: In silence
Reposition Go Forth	Closing Prayer: Jesus, thank you for the great gift of Holy Communion. We honour you here with us today
	Jesus is placed in the Tabernacle (if in church)
	Acclamation: Jesus, we adore you.
Holding Hearts	Energised by the life and love of Jesus. "Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well."

A visit to Jesus Present in the Blessed Sacrament - Healing

Every year we have some special days of prayer called "The 40 Hours" to make time to say thank you to Jesus. We have so much to say thank you for but sometimes we forget.

"The Blessed Sacrament" is another way of seeing Jesus present in Holy Communion. Jesus is very close to us here.

Exposition

Gather: Who do you want to pray for today?
Tell Jesus what is in your heart and how you need Him to help you and know that He will always hear you.

Adoration Listen: Gospel Reading: From the Gospel of Luke 17: 11-19 On the way to Jerusalem he was passing along between Samaria and Galilee. And as he entered a village, he was met by ten lepers, who stood at a distance and lifted up their voices and said, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us."

When he saw them he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went they were cleansed. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks. Now he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine? Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" And he said to him, "Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well." – silent reflection

Respond:

What do we learn from this Gospel story? What do you want to thank Jesus for today? How do you need Jesus to help you?

After each prayer we say: LORD IN YOUR MERCY HEAR OUR PRAYER.

We pray for our parish and our school.

We pray for our families and our friends.

We pray for everyone who is sick and for the people looking after them.

We pray for everyone living where there is war or hunger.

We pray for everyone who is unhappy or lonely.

We pray for all priests and sisters.

We pray that God will help us to be kind and loving to other people.

We pray that we will use the gifts and talents God has given us to make the world a better place.

Traditional Prayer: Our Father

HYMN

Be still for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One is here. Come, bow before Him now, with reverence and fear. In Him no sin is found, we stand on holy ground. Be still, for the presence of the Lord, the Holy One is here.

Reposition

Go Forth: Jesus, thank you for the great gift of Holy Communion.

We honour you here with us today.

Everything we have comes from you.

Thank you for all the great gifts you have given us.

Bless our parish and our school.

Be with our families and help us every day. AMEN.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. **AMEN.**

Acclamation: Jesus, we adore you. Lay our lives before you. How we love you.

Adoration Listen	Reading: St. Paul's letter to the Romans 12: 9-18 'Do everything possible on your part to live in peace with everybody.'
Adoration Respond	Silent reflection – time with Jesus What do we learn from this Scripture reading? What do you want to thank Jesus for today? How do you need Jesus to help you?
	Litany: Jesus help us to live in peace.
	Traditional Prayer: Our Father
Benediction (priest or deacon)	Music: Reflective, instrumental music Blessing: In silence
Reposition: Go Forth	Closing Prayer: Teresa of Avila—Christ has no body <i>Children hold hands as they recite.</i>

	Acclamation: Taize - My peace I leave you. My peace I give you.

	Who do you want to pray for today? Tell Jesus what is in your heart and how you need Him to help you and know that He will always hear you.
Adoration Listen	Reading: Gospel according to John 13: 34-35 'I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."
Adoration Respond	Silent reflection – time with Jesus What do we learn from this Gospel story? What do you want to thank Jesus for today? How do you need Jesus to help you?
	Litany: Jesus help us to love one another.
	Traditional Prayer: Our Father
Benediction (priest or deacon)	Hymn: A New Commandment Blessing: In silence Divine Praises: Blessed be God (use as appropriate to the age and stage of the children).
Reposition: Go Forth	Closing Prayer: Teresa of Avila—Christ has no body <i>Children hold hands as they recite.</i>
	Jesus is placed in the Tabernacle (if in church).
	Acclamation: Taize - We adore you, Lord Jesus Christ.
Holding Hearts	Energised by the life and love of Jesus. "Love one another, as I have loved you."
